"Art Outside IX", by Jake Seniuk On Center, July - September 2008 DEANNA PINDELL (Port Hadlock) has imported segments of another fallen woods soldier, this one a giant old willow that met the chopping block because it was "too messy." Pindell has created a memorial by mounting a segment of one of its massive trunks as if it were the bronze statue of an anonymous amputee veteran. Blanched to a ghostly pallor and stained blue in its sunken fissures, it has a mummified anatomical aspect that makes it seem almost human.

The sensation of fulfillment embodied in Hoy's dense forms is turned inside out in Deanna Pindell's (Port Hadlock) gourd-like 3-D encaustics. Standing five feet tall and hollow as a seashell, her Eve is all about potential, about waiting to be filled. With her patient process of progressively thickening this feminine husk with layer upon layer of wax, the artist has set in motion a sculptural analogy for the accumulation of knowledge and experience, which eventually fills up our days and our own physical shells.

"Second Wind Blows In", by Jake Seniuk On Center, July - September 2007 **DEANNA PINDELL** (Port Hadlock) creates a more private space with her stark ghost-like Dream Tree and accompanying bench. Fashioned from white wax encaustic and PVC-pipe her blanched meditation spot looks like a bus stop mirage materialized in the woods.

DEANNA PINDELL (Port Townsend) and PAMELA HASTINGS (Port Angeles) push their assemblages into the round with a dash of Surrealism. Pindell's Seven Generations is a ghostly aviary fitted together from white PVC pipe and populated by a flock of albino birds fashioned from cast paper and sealed in encaustic wax.
